## History of the Rice Cup

1944 was the centenary of the death of Blessed Edmund Rice (1762 – 1844). The Department of Posts and Telegraphs issued a commemorative stamp for the occasion. Most Rev. Father M. Lee P.P. in the Thurles area approached the Brothers and suggested that he would present a cup, The Rice Cup for a Hurling Competition for under 14 year olds, open to the Brothers Schools in the Archdiocese of Cashel and Emly. This suggestion was acted upon and a committee was formed. In the early day of the competition, Thurles, Cashel, Doon, Tipperary Town CBS and Hospital (De La Salle) were the main participants. Thurles were the inaugural winners of the competition. In 1989, the Westcourt Cup was introduced as a "B" competition. The family of former underage Kilkenny hurler Dr Tom Barry of Callan sponsored the Westcourt Cup. In 2012, the Rice Shield was introduced as an extra competition to allow teams give all their panel members valuable games.

Br. O'Connell, our present Chairperson has almost singlehandedly kept this fine competition going for the past few decades. He first coached Templemore CBS in Rice Cup in 1967, winning his first title in 1969 against Charleville. Charleville player on the day, Paddy Kelly went on to teach and coach in the Abbey CBS for a number of years and was also Chairperson of the Rice Cup. Paddy coached the Abbey CBS to their sole Rice Cup victory in 1991. Br. O'Connell taught in Nenagh CBS for years and managed their winning team in 1988.

### **Callan CBS and the Rice Cup**

For a school that has rarely had more than 250 pupils Coláiste Éamann Rís, Callan has a proud history of involvement in the Rice and Westcourt cups. The competition was 24 years old before Callan secured their first victory in a final in 1968 with a win over Doon CBS, a school who had 3 victories in the competition by this stage. The Callan team was trained by Galway man Mick McHugh assisted by Br Sreenan.



It took the school until 1986 to register their second victory when they had a convincing win over a fancied Sexton Street from Limerick in Thurles. This side was captained by Michael Moran (Dunnamaggin) and trained by another Galway man, Frank McKenna, assisted by All Ireland winning Kilkenny priest Fr Tommy Murphy.



In 1989 a casual conversation between Frank and Callan businessman, Pierce Barry yielded great dividends for underage hurling. Pierce, and his sister Breda Somers, were looking for a way to commemorate their recently deceased brother and famed underage Kilkenny hurler Dr Tom Barry. Frank gave two possible suggestions not expecting that both would be delivered but delivered they were. Identical cups were commissioned. One was presented to Leinster Colleges for the under 14 A grade and is known now as the Dr Barry Cup. The second is the Westcourt cup which will be played for in the second game today. In 1992 Callan, trained by Tipperary man Tim Kennedy were narrowly defeated in the final by today's contestants, Kilkenny CBS. However, things would soon change. The cohort of students who would eventually bring Leinster Senior Colleges glory to the school in 1998 were now playing Rice cup and this led to victories in 1993 and 1994. Having suffered a one point defeat in the final of the Rice Cup in 1992 a renewed effort was made in 1993 by trainer Frank McKenna now assisted by Br Liam Burke. Having accounted for Cashel C.B.S and Nenagh C.B.S., they were pitted against Thurles C.B.S. in the final. In dreadful conditions and led on by Capt. John Hickey they came through on a score line of 2-1 to 1-2. The Thurles team included one Niall Cahill who has done so much as an officer in the Rice cup committee to keep the competition alive.




In 1994, the 150th anniversary of the death of Edmund Rice, the Rice Cup was retained when in the final Callan beat Templemore C.B.S. on a score line of 0-8 to 1-1. That final, like today's, was played in John Locke Park Callan to mark the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Rice Cup. This team was captained by Noel Hickey, brother of John, who went on to win 10 All Ireland (county and club) winners medals and included a number of players who later gained inter county success with Kilkenny such as James Ryall and John Paul Corcoran.



In 1995 Callan, on the cusp of a three in-a-row, were beaten by a point after injury time in extra time of a replay in the semi-final against Ard Scoil Rís Limerick. But they didn't have to wait long to taste further success. In 1997 Kilkenny woman Catherine Rice-Kelly became the first woman to train a Rice Cup winning side assisted by staff member and former pupil Dermot Ronan. This team was captained by goalkeeper David Herity who went on to great success in that position with the Kilkenny team.



Further glory was to come in 2001. The sixth and, to date final, success was hard earned. It was achieved after victories over Clonmel, Kilkenny, Ennis and Nenagh CBS culminating in a 1-9 to 1-8 victory in Templemore over Thurles CBS in the final. That side was captained by Eoghan Fahy and trained again by Mrs Rice Kelly and Mr Ronan.



So, as we head into the 75<sup>th</sup> Rice Cup final Callan, with 6 victories, lie proudly in 3<sup>rd</sup> place in the Roll of honour behind Templemore (2<sup>nd</sup>) and Thurles (1<sup>st</sup>). Ominously the schools in 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> are today's contestants. We wish them both well. Best of luck to Niall Cahill and those running the competition.

### Br. Ó Donnchú: Our former principal, colleague and friend.

#### Former Principal Thurles CBS & Kilkenny CBS

It was with deep sadness that we, the staff of Thurles C.B.S. received the sad news of the passing of our former principal, colleague and friend Br. O Donnchú. For those who worked with him he was known simply as the 'The Boss', a term of endearment and endear himself to us he most certainly did.

Br. Ó Donnchú came to Thurles in 1991 and he remained with us as principal until 2001 when he retired to the missions in Zambia. However he always maintained his links with the school and helped in establishing our immersion project, the seeds of which were sown in 2004 when two members of the teaching staff went to Zambia and met with Br. Ó Donnchú in Mufilira. His enthusiasm and eagerness to maintain his link with the C.B.S resulted in our first immersion project in 2005. This was the first of many trips our students made to Zambia where they worked alongside Br. Ó Donnchú in the local communities. Much needed funds were raised which helped in building schools, workshops and many other much needed infrastructure. The famous 'Tipperary Plots' in the middle of Murundu compound were cultivated by Br. Mick as he endeavoured to teach the locals the importance of growing crops and being self-sufficient.

Br.Ó Donnchu made our visits to Zambia possible. Without his help and encouragement before, during and indeed after the trips to Zambia the project would not have been possible. He provided a safe environment for us on our visits.

During his time as principal of the C.B.S. he not only managed the school but he also taught many classes and also involved himself in coaching hurling teams. He taught computer classes, music classes, Irish classes, religion classes and many more. He made it his business to teach classes and involve himself in the lives of each of the students.

Being a proud Tipperary man, his love of hurling was clear to all. While the Harty Cup eluded him during his time as principal, he saw the Dean Ryan cup come to Thurles in 1992 and the White cup in 1996, 1997 and 2001. He was so proud of his links with Thurles C.B.S when in 2009 and 2015 the Dr. Harty cup finally made its way back into the trophy cabinet in Thurles

C.B.S. How apt it was that some of his former students were part of the management team that brought our school to victory. He followed every game from afar.

Many past pupils recall how he brought the teams to the Mona Lisa after matches and how he would call a whole school assembly to celebrate our successes in sport. With great enthusiasm he would take out the guitar and sing 'Slievenamon 'at the top of his voice. He referred to these occasions as' The Huha in the hall.' Everyone would join in the celebration feeling uplifted and enthused. His vibrant personality rubbed off on everyone: wellbeing at its very best.

He is remembered by all, both past pupils and those of us lucky to have worked with him as a kind and caring man who treated all who knew him with absolute respect. He knew each of his pupils by name and he knew where they came from. In fact he maintained connections with many of his past pupils corresponding with them regularly and updating them with stories of his work and life in Zambia.

He lived his life embracing the spirit and ethos of Blessed Edmund Rice. His kindness was clear for all to see during his time in Thurles. Summer months were often spent touring Europe on his motorbike, visiting with fellow Christian Brothers around the world, organising shipments of old sewing machines, computers and anything he felt might be of use to developing communities. Never a man to rest on his laurels he was regularly seen walking the countryside of Tipperary, his mind always working on ways he could help others less fortunate than himself.

Although he left us as principal in 2001 we always felt so connected with him and his presence at our many Bicentennial celebrations in 2016 was wonderful. It was particularly special that that he was home to perform at our past pupils concert where he took to the stage and entertained the audience with many of his old classics. He loved the stage and loved entertaining others. Being in the company of so many past pupils and former staff members along with current staff was special and many stories were shared over the course of the night. We will always remember his kindness and generosity, the many hot breakfasts quietly organised for those who needed them in the monastery kitchen. We remember his famous Russian hat and the many school trips when he himself would drive the school mini bus, be it to a match, to a retreat or a school tour. We remember his smile, his greeting and his handshake. We remember his warmth and welcoming voice. We will no longer meet him in the staffroom or on the corridors as we did during his many visits home but we treasure the memories he has left us with. While we all have a different story to tell, we smile when we recall his favourite song

'Happiness, Happiness, the greatest gift that that I possess,

I thank the Lord that I've been blessed

With more than my share of happiness.'

Br. Ó Donnchú shared that happiness with all those who were privileged to have known him and for that we are forever grateful.
